2. Maryanne's story

2.1 Who is Maryanne?

Maryanne is a koala that has survived a bushfire in Queensland, Australia.

2.2 Explain how WWF supporters have helped Maryanne.

The money donated by the supporters was used to pay for her treatment in hospital and for her care. It also helps specialised vets to take care of the injured animals.

2.3 In what way did the bushfires affect the work of the RSPCA?

The RSPCA have received three times the numbers of koalas. The number of animals in general has doubled, they are getting over 80 animals per day.

2.4 Why is it important to take care of every injured koala?

They had already been threatened with extinction before the bushfires, therefore it's important to save every life.
